THE CUSTOMS LAWS, 1936 AND 1937.

ORDER IN COUNCIL No. 1766 MADE UNDER SECTION 52.

H. R. PALMER,

Governor.

In exercise of the powers vested in him by section 52 of the Customs Laws, 1936 and 1937, His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, has been pleased to order and it is hereby ordered as follows:—

1. This Order may be cited as the Import Duty (Mining Materials and Plant) Exemption Order, 1938.

2. Goods and materials enumerated in the First Schedule to this Order—

- (a) imported into the Colony between the 1st day of January, 1938, and the 31st day of December, 1939, both days inclusive, and
- (b) proved to the satisfaction of the Comptroller by the production of plans and specifications to be solely required for use by the importer for mining or ore treatment operations or for mills, cyanide or power plant buildings, workshops, tanks, warehouses and engineering structures to be used by the importer in connection therewith,

shall-

- (i) if proved to the satisfaction of the Comptroller to be of British Empire origin, be admitted into the Colony free from all import duties, or
- (ii) if proved to the satisfaction of the Comptroller to be unobtainable within the British Empire at a sufficiently cheap price in the quality or quantity required for the purposes aforesaid, pay import duty equal to one-third of the rate of import duty set forth in the General Tariff in the First Schedule to the Customs Laws, 1936 and 1937, and payable thereunder in respect of such goods or materials.

3. Goods and materials enumerated in the Second Schedule to this Order—

(a) imported into the Colony between the 1st day of January, 1938, and the 1st day of December, 1941, both days inclusive, and (b) prove to the satisfaction of the Comptroller to be solely required for use by the importer for mining or ore treatment operations,

shall—

- (i) if proved to the satisfaction of the Comptroller to be of British Empire origin, be admitted into the Colony free of all import duties, or
- (ii) if proved to the satisfaction of the Comptroller to be unobtainable within the British Empire at a sufficiently cheap price in the quality or quantity required for the purposes aforesaid, pay import duty equal to one-third of the rate of import duty set forth in the General Tariff in the First Schedule to the Customs Laws, 1936 and 1937, and payable thereunder in respect of such goods or materials.

FIRST SCHEDULE.

1. Fabricated structural steel with bolts, nuts and rivets ready for erection.

2. Corrugated iron sheets, galvanized or ungalvanized, and fittings for attachment.

3. Steel sash and steel doors.

4. Reinforcing steel bars.

5. Punched steel plates ready for assembling into tanks.

SECOND SCHEDULE.

- 1. Iron or steel or alloy balls, wearing plates, mantles, liners in all shapes, roll shells and discs, for use in ore crushing machinery or ore grinding mills.
- 2. Asbestos or composition sheeting in rolls to be used for flooring under mineral heaps.
- 3. Expanded metal and steel to be used in stoping operations.

THE BURIALS LAWS, 1896 AND 1937.

ORDER MADE UNDER SECTION 1.

Whereas the burial-ground situated in the village of Ayios Yeoryios, District of Kyrenia, now in use by the Orthodox-Christian Community for the burial of the dead, is dangerous to the health of the said village :

Now, therefore, in exercise of the powers vested in him by section 1 of the Burials Laws, 1896 and 1937, His Excellency the Governor has been pleased to order and hereby orders that a new burial-ground, in substitution for the burial-ground now in use as aforesaid, shall be provided under the provisions of the said Laws.
