

No. 193. THE LIGHTING CONTROL LAW, 1938.

REGULATIONS MADE UNDER SECTION 2.

In exercise of the powers conferred on him by section 2 of the Lighting Control Law, 1938, His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, is pleased to make and hereby makes the following regulations by express command for the purpose of a practice for an occasion of emergency or public danger.

1. These Regulations may be cited as the Lighting Control (Practice) Regulations, 1939.

2. These Regulations shall be in force during the whole period between 8 p.m. on Sunday the 3rd September and 12 midnight on Monday the 4th September, 1939.

3. On the sounding of the warning signal, which shall take the form of a succession of continuous long blasts upon the town sirens, all lights, in any town in which prior notice of a practice has been given by the Commissioner of the District, whether public or private, which, if unobscured, would be visible from the air, land or sea, must be extinguished, or, in the case of indoor lights, obscured so as to be invisible from outside and all other lights in the neighbourhood of any water front must be extinguished.

4. All such lights shall remain so extinguished or obscured until the sounding of the "all clear" signal which shall take the form of prolonged blasts on the sirens at intervals of half a minute.

Provided that this regulation shall not apply to lights on vehicles or to lights which are indispensable to navigation or to such public lights as, in the opinion of the Commissioner or Superintendent of Police, are necessary for public safety.

5. All lights which are not extinguished must be reduced to the minimum intensity consistent with safety.

6. The following restrictions on the use of lights on vehicles shall be observed.

(a) The use on motor vehicles of headlights of all descriptions is prohibited.

(b) Not more than two lamps showing a light to the front may be used on any vehicle.

(c) No lights whatever shall be shown from any stationary vehicle.

7. All instructions which may be given by the Commissioner or Superintendent of Police for the purpose of enforcing these regulations must be observed.
