I, the Governor in Council, in exercise of the powers conferred by section 52 of the Customs Laws, 1936 to 1939, and of every other power hereunto enabling, do hereby order as follows:—

1. This Order may be cited as the Importation of Certain Goods (Prohibition) (Repeal) Order, 1940.

2. The Importation of Certain Goods (Prohibition) Orders, 1939 to (No. 3) 1940, are hereby repealed without prejudice to anything done or left undone thereunder.

No. 133. THE CUSTOMS LAWS, 1936 TO 1939.

ORDER IN COUNCIL No. 1942

MADE UNDER SECTION 52.

I, the Governor in Council, in exercise of the powers conferred by section 52 of the Customs Laws, 1936 to 1939, do hereby order as follows:—

1. This Order may be cited as the Importation of Certain Goods (Restriction) Consolidation Order, 1940.

2. From and after the publication of this Order in the *Gazette*, the importation into the Colony of the goods set out in the Schedule hereto not being consigned from and grown, produced or manufactured in the British Empire (other than Canada and Newfoundland) is prohibited save under the authority of a licence granted by the Registrar of Co-operative Societies and subject to such terms and conditions as may be prescribed in such licence:

Provided that nothing in this Order contained shall apply—

- (a) to any goods proved to the satisfaction of the Comptroller of Customs and Inland Revenue to have been shipped to the Colony prior to the 9th day of December, 1939; or
- (b) to any goods consigned through the Postal Service where the value of such goods does not exceed three pounds and such goods are consigned to a private individual for his personal use; or
- (c) to any *bona fide* baggage (as defined in item 9 of the Second Schedule to the Customs Laws, 1936 to 1939) being the property of and accompanied by a passenger and proved to the satisfaction of the Comptroller of Customs and Inland Revenue to be for the personal use of such passenger.

3. The Importation of Certain Goods (Restriction) Orders, 1939 to (No. 5) 1940, are hereby repealed, without prejudice to anything done or left undone thereunder.

In exercise of the powers vested in him by Article 3 of the Emergency Powers (Colonial Defence) Order in Council, 1939, and the Emergency Powers (Defence) Act, 1939, His Excellency the Governor has been pleased to make and hereby makes the following regulation :—

1. These Regulations may be cited as the Emergency Powers (Cyprus Defence) Amendment Regulations, 1940, and shall be read as one with the Emergency Powers (Cyprus Defence) Regulations, 1939 to (No. 1) 1939, (hereinafter referred to as "the principal Regulations"), and the principal Regulations and these Regulations may together be cited as the Emergency Powers (Cyprus Defence) Regulations, 1939 to 1940.
