No. 226. THE CUSTOMS LAWS, 1936 TO 1940.

ORDER IN COUNCIL No. 1953

MADE UNDER SECTION 52.

W. D. BATTERSHILL, Governor.

I, the Governor in Council, in exercise of the powers conferred by section 52 of the Customs Laws, 1936 to 1940, do hereby order as follows:—

1. This Order may be cited as the Import Duty (Zinc and Other

Sheets for Printing) Exemption Order, 1940.

- 2. All zinc, copper and brass sheets which are proved to the satisfaction of the Comptroller of Customs and Inland Revenue to be of British Empire origin and to be imported into the Colony by or on behalf of any person possessing a printing press under the provisions of the Newspaper, Books and Printing Presses Laws, 1934 to 1936, for use by such person in printing or photo-engraving processes shall be admitted into the Colony free from all import duties: Provided that the person possessing the printing press shall sign a declaration in the Form in the Schedule hereto.
- 3. This Order shall be deemed to have come into operation on the 18th April, 1940.

SCHEDULE.

The Import Duty (Zinc and Other Sheets for Printing) Exemption Order, 1940.

DECLARATION.

- I, the undersigned.....hereby declare as follows:—
- 1. I possess a printing press under permit dated.....granted under the Newspaper, Books and Printing Presses Laws, 1934 to 1936.
- 2. The following sheets of have been imported into the Colony $\frac{\text{by myself.}}{\text{on mv behalf.}}$
- 3. The above sheets are imported solely for use by me in printing or photo-engraving processes and for no other purpose.

4. If I fail to observe the terms of this declaration I shall pay to the Comptroller the full import duty for the time being in force for any such sheets without prejudice to any other proceedings which may be taken

5. I agree that the Comptroller or any person authorized by him in that behalf shall at all times have the power and right to enter any premises wherein any such sheets as aforesaid are stored or kept for the purpose of ensuring that the terms of this declaration are complied with.

2. The Schedule to the principal Order is hereby amended by the addition thereto of the following item:-

"95. Foodstuffs not otherwise specified."
