THE ADULTERATION OF PRODUCE LAWS, 1926 TO 1935.

REGULATIONS MADE UNDER SECTION 10.

I, the Governor in Council, in exercise of the powers conferred by section 10 of the Adulteration of Produce Laws, 1926 to 1935, do hereby make the following Regulations:—

1. These Regulations may be cited as the Adulteration of Produce (Local Sales) Regulations, 1940.

2. The proportion of foreign ingredients or extraneous matter permitted in the sale or preparation for sale in the Colony of any of the produce set out in the first column of the Schedule hereto shall not be greater than the maximum percentage set out in the second column of such Schedule against each such produce and any produce containing any foreign ingredients or extraneous matter in excess of such percentages shall be deemed to be adulterated.

3. In the case of carobs, what are commonly known as "wild carobs" shall be deemed to be a foreign ingredient or extraneous matter.

THE CUSTOMS LAWS, 1936 TO 1940.

NOTIFICATION UNDER SECTION 66.
