No. 440. THE CONTAGIOUS DISEASES (ANIMALS) LAW, 1880.

ORDER UNDER SECTION 2 (1) (l.).

In exercise of the powers vested in the Governor by section 2 (1) (l.) of the Contagious Diseases (Animals) Law, 1880, duly deputed to me under section 4 of the said Law by paragraph 3 of the Notification No. 527 published in the *Gazette* of the 3rd July, 1931, I, Robert Jestin Roe, Chief Veterinary Officer, hereby order as follows:—

1. This Order may be cited as the Ox Warble-Fly Control General Order, 1940.
2. In this Order "cattle" includes any bull, calf, cow, heifer or ox.
3. All cattle in the Colony shall be treated for the destruction of warble-fly larvae not less than once in each month between 1st December, 1940, and 30th April, 1941.
4. The treatment shall be carried out free of charge by Veterinary Officers or by such Dressers as may be appointed by me in writing in that behalf.
5. Every owner or person in charge of cattle shall produce such cattle for treatment at such places and at such times as shall be appointed by a Veterinary Officer or Dresser as aforesaid by a notice posted in a conspicuous place in the village concerned, and every such owner or person in charge shall render full assistance to the Veterinary Officer or Dresser in the treatment of the cattle as aforesaid.
