not exceeding six per centum (6%) per annum subject to the following terms and conditions, that is to say,-

(a) that the sum borrowed shall be repayable by the Municipal Corporation to the lender in eight equal annual instalments (comprising sinking fund and interest);

(b) that the Municipal Corporation shall, in each year and until final repayment of the sum borrowed, insert in the annual estimates as a charge on the revenues the annual sum payable as aforesaid in the year to which such estimates relate:

(c) that the sum borrowed shall be utilized by the Municipal Corporation for

the following purposes, that is to say,—

(i) for the purchase of land for the extension of the Municipal Market a sum of £2,000;

(ii) for the construction of new sheds, stalls, etc., a sum of £3,000; and

(iii) for the construction of public latrines within the municipal limits a sum of £2,000.

2. This Order shall be deemed to have been made on the 10th day of May, 1940.

THE CUSTOMS LAWS, 1936 TO (No. 2) 1940.

ORDER IN COUNCIL No. 1980

MADE UNDER SECTION 59.

W. D. BATTERSHILL, Governor.

I, the Governor in Council, in exercise of the powers conferred by section 59 of the Customs Laws, 1936 to (No. 2) 1940, do hereby order as follows:—

1. This Order may be cited as the Export of Goods Prohibition (No. 2) Order,

1940.

2. The export from the Colony of all goods is prohibited save under a licence granted by the Registrar of Co-operative Societies and subject to such terms and conditions as may be specified in such licence: Provided that all goods enumerated in the First Schedule hereto may be exported without a licence to destinations within the British Empire, Palestine and Egypt.

3. Nothing in this Order contained shall apply to any bona fide baggage as defined in item 9 of the Second Schedule to the Customs Laws, 1936 to (No. 2) 1940: Provided that such goods are the property of and are accompanied by a passenger and are proved to the satisfaction of the Comptroller of Customs and Inland Revenue to be for the personal use of such passenger, not being any of the goods enumerated in the Second Schedule hereto.

4. The Export of Goods Prohibition Orders, 1940, are hereby revoked.
