

No. 106. THE HOTELS LAWS, 1935 TO 1943.

REGULATIONS MADE UNDER SECTION 12.

In exercise of the powers vested in me by the Hotels Laws, 1935 to 1943, I, the Acting Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby make the following regulations :—

1. These regulations may be cited as the Hotels Regulations, 1949.
2. In these regulations, unless the context otherwise requires—

“camp hotel” means a Summer Resort Hotel carrying on business in tents and/or huts or partly in a building and partly in tents and/or huts and references to a hotel-keeper shall include a camp hotel-keeper ;

“full board” includes—

- (a) accommodation ;
- (b) breakfast ;
- (c) lunch ;
- (d) dinner ; and
- (e) bath ;

“Inspector” means any person appointed by the Hotels Board to be an inspector for the purposes of these regulations ;

“Summer Resort Hotel” means any hotel carrying on business at any summer resort under the Summer Resorts (Development) Laws, 1938 and 1946, or any Law amending or substituted for the same.

3. Every hotel in respect of which a licence is issued under the provisions of the Hotels Laws, 1935 to 1943, shall be classified by the Hotels Board as—

- (a) a first class hotel ;
- (b) a second class hotel ;
- (c) a third class hotel ;
- (d) a fourth class hotel ; or
- (e) a fifth class hotel.

4. A hotel shall be classified as a first class hotel if—

- (a) it has one bath-room and one water-closet with complete modern sanitary installation (enamelled bath and basin and an adequate supply of running hot and cold water) to not more than six beds : provided that no bath or water-closet in any room with a private bath and water-closet shall be taken into account ;
- (b) it has in every room two electric lights (one bed light and another in such position as may be approved by the Hotels Board) and electric bell installation in good working order ;
- (c) it has an adequate supply of hot and cold running water in every room ;
- (d) it has a drawing-room or a sitting room and a reading or writing room suitably furnished and equipped with sufficient apparatus or fire-places for heating purposes in winter and, in places other than summer resorts, sufficient apparatus for cooling purposes in the summer ;
- (e) it has a dining-room with separate tables ;
- (f) it has on the ground floor separate lavatories for ladies and separate for gentlemen with complete sanitary installation and running water ;
- (g) it has normally a water supply at a rate of not less than 50 okes per head per day ; and
- (h) generally, it is in the opinion of the Hotels Board furnished and maintained, having regard to local conditions, up to the standard of a first class hotel.

5. A hotel shall be classified as a second class hotel if—
- (a) it has one bath-room and one water-closet with complete sanitary installation (enamelled bath and basin and an adequate supply of running water) to not more than ten beds ;
 - (b) it has in every room two electric lights (one bed light and another in such position as may be approved by the Hotels Board) and electric bell installation in good working order ;
 - (c) it has normally a water supply at a rate of not less than 50 okes per head per day ;
 - (d) it has a drawing-room or a sitting room suitably furnished and equipped with sufficient apparatus or fire-places for heating purposes in winter and, in places other than summer resorts, sufficient apparatus for cooling purposes in the summer ;
 - (e) it has a dining-room with separate tables ;
 - (f) it has on the ground floor separate lavatories for ladies and separate for gentlemen with complete sanitary installation and running water ;
 - (g) generally, it is in the opinion of the Hotels Board furnished and maintained, having regard to local conditions, up to the standard of a second class hotel.
6. A hotel shall be classified as a third class hotel if—
- (a) it has one bath-room and one water-closet to not more than sixteen beds ;
 - (b) it has electric light installation in every bedroom ;
 - (c) it has normally a water supply at a rate of not less than 50 okes per head per day ;
 - (d) it has a sitting room ;
 - (e) it has on the ground floor suitable water-closet accommodation.
7. A hotel shall be classified as fourth class hotel if—
- (a) it has one bath-room and one water-closet to not more than twenty-five beds ;
 - (b) it has electric light installation in every bedroom ;
 - (c) it has normally a piped water supply ;
 - (d) it has a sitting room ;
 - (e) in the opinion of the Hotels Board the said hotel is being kept and conducted in such a satisfactory manner as to justify the Hotels Board to classify same as a fourth class hotel.
8. A hotel shall be classified as a fifth class hotel if it does not conform to the requirements provided by these regulations for first, second, third or fourth class hotels.
- 9.—(1) The Hotels Board shall, upon the classification of any hotel in accordance with the provisions of these regulations send to the hotel-keeper a notice in writing in the form contained in the First Schedule hereto informing him of such classification.
- (2) The hotel-keeper shall exhibit such notice in the hall of the hotel and he shall not advertise or describe his hotel except as a hotel of the class described in such notice.
10. Every hotel-keeper shall—
- (a) prepare and exhibit in each bedroom and the entrance hall a list of the charges made in accordance with the Second Schedule hereto together with a copy of the definition of the expression "full board" ;
 - (b) every hotel-keeper shall keep a register in the form contained in the Third Schedule hereto wherein he shall enter all the particulars specified in the Schedule ;
 - (c) every hotel-keeper shall supply upon demand the Hotels Board or any person appointed by them in that behalf with such information or returns as they may require showing the number of guests staying in his hotel at any particular time or times.

11. No person shall be charged by any hotel-keeper or by any other person acting on his behalf or otherwise having the management of his hotel, in respect of any of the items set out in the Second Schedule hereto in excess of the rates therein set out in connection with such item.

12. Notwithstanding anything in these regulations contained, the Hotels Board—

- (a) may fix the maximum charges which may be made by a hotel-keeper for drinks to guests staying in or visiting his hotel ;
- (b) in the case of camp hotels, may fix the maximum charges which may be made for full board, having regard to the general conditions prevailing at such camp hotel and the manner in which it is kept and managed ;
- (c) if, having regard to all the circumstances of the case, it considers it fair and equitable, may, by special licence under the hand of the Chairman, permit the hotel-keeper of any hotel specified in the licence to make such charge for full board as may be specified therein, notwithstanding that such charges may be in excess of the charges fixed by these regulations.

13.—(1) Any Inspector acting in the course of his duties as such may, with a view to securing compliance with the provisions of these regulations—

- (a) at any time enter and inspect any hotel or camp hotel ;
- (b) require any hotel-keeper or any of his employees, servants or agents to produce to him any books of accounts or other documents or any article or thing relating to the business of the hotel or camp hotel ;
- (c) investigate any matter arising out of the provisions of these regulations which, in his opinion, requires investigation ;
- (d) interrogate any person whom he finds in any hotel or camp hotel or whom he believes to be employed or to have been employed in such hotel or camp hotel, with respect to any of the matters dealt with in these regulations ;
- (e) seize and detain any books of accounts or other documents or any article or thing relating to the business of any hotel or camp hotel if he suspects that they contain evidence of commission of a contravention of the provisions of these regulations.

(2) No person shall—

- (a) prevent, obstruct, hinder or impede any Inspector in the exercise of his powers and duties under these regulations ;
- (b) refuse or fail to produce any book, account or document or any article or thing relating to the business of any hotel or camp hotel on demand being made by any Inspector for such production ;
- (c) refuse or fail to answer to the best of his knowledge and belief any question which any Inspector in the exercise of his powers and duties under these regulations may put to him.

14. Any person who acts in contravention of, or fails to observe, any of the provisions of these regulations shall be liable to a fine not exceeding fifty pounds and, if the offender is a hotel-keeper, the court trying the offence may, upon conviction, in addition to such fine, order the cancellation of his licence.

15. The Hotels Regulations, 1935 to 1948, are hereby repealed.

- (a) a Summer Resort Hotel shall be entitled to charge throughout the year up to 15% in excess of the above rates ;
- (b) there shall be deducted 5% on full board rates to guests staying for a period of one month or more ;
- (c) there shall be deducted 25% on full board rates to children under 8 years of age.

THE SHEEP, GOATS AND PIGS (ENUMERATION) LAW, 1948.
