THE CUSTOMS LAW.

ORDER IN COUNCIL No. 2670

MADE UNDER SECTION 52.

In exercise of the powers vested in me by section 52 of the Customs Law, I, the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby order as follows:—

1. This Order may be cited as the Consular Supplies (Import Duty Exemption) Order, 1954. Cap. 292
5 of 1952
19 of 1953
27 of 1953

2. Consular supplies, that is to say, articles of furniture, stationery, books and any other articles which are sent by a foreign Government for the official use of its consular officers in Cyprus shall be admitted into the Colony free of import duty:

Provided that a consular officer, who applies for exemption hereunder, shall address to the Comptroller a written declaration, in the form prescribed by the Comptroller, specifying the date and place of importation, the name of the importing ship, the number of packages and the marks thereon, and the nature, quantity and value of the consular supplies, and stating that they are required for the use of the consulate and will not be used for any other purpose. In the case of a postal package, the declaration shall specify the number and date of the notification issued by the postal authorities on arrival of the package, instead of the date and place of importation and the name of the importing ship.

3. For the purposes of this Order, "consular officer" means a consul-general, consul, vice-consul or pro-consul, de carrière.
