## ORDER IN COUNCIL No. 2771 <br> made under Section 5 .

In exercise of the powers vested in him by section 5 of the Customs 10 of 1955. (Wharfage Dues) Law, 1955, His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, has been pleased to order as follows :-

1. This Order may be cited as the Customs (Wharfage Dues) (Revision) Order, 1955, and shall come into force on the ist day of August, 1955.
2. For the wharfage dues set out in the Schedule to the Customs 10 of 1955. (Wharfage Dues) Law, 1955, there shall be substituted the following wharfage dues :-

## Exemptions.

I. Goods imported by or for the use of the Government or any department of Her Majesty's Government ; goods imported by and for Her Majesty's Forces (including goods imported by the Navy, Army and Air Force Institutes for sale to members of Her Majesty's Forces) ; personal baggage accompanied by the passenger ; used empty sacks; empty barrels and outer packages (excluding jars or demijohns); firewood; specie ; hay and straw ; wooden hoops and staves for the manufacture of casks; samples which cannot be sold as merchandise; sulphur ; and goods from other ports in the Colony.
2.- (a) All goods landed at any port in the Colony and declared at the time of landing to be destined for a foreign port shall on being shipped be exempt from the wharfage dues for imports and shall be liable only to one-fifth of the rates levied as wharfage dues for exports hereunder.
(b) All goods landed in error at any port in the Colony shall on being shipped be exempt from the wharfage dues for imports and shall be liable only to the wharfage dues for exports levied hereunder.
(c) Nothing in this paragraph contained shall apply to bonded goods.
3. Stores and equipment for vessels of war and for yachts used solely for the purpose of pleasure.
4. Aviation lubricating oils and fuels: Provided that after clearance from Customs, they shall be deposited in a licensed warehouse to be issued directly therefrom to and solely for use in aircraft, to the satisfaction of the Comptroller.
5. Produce of Cyprus which has been exported therefrom and is subsequently returned as unmarketable or for any other reason could not be disposed of abroad.
6. All materials and equipment imported for the construction and operation of the Monitoring Station run by the Foreign Broadcast Information Service and of the Near East Arab Broadcasting Station run by the Near East Association Ltd.
7. Vehicles and goods imported by visitors exempted from wharfage dues under and in accordance with the Customs (Wharfage Concossions to Visitors) Order. in isg

## Exemiptions.

I. Goods exported by or for the Government or any department of Her Majesty's Government ; goods exported by Her Majesty's Forces (including goods imported for sale to Her Majesty's Forces which are being exported) ; personal baggage accompanied by the passenger ; used empty sacks ; empty barrels and outer packages (excluding jars or demijohns) ; salt ; straw ; mats for use as dunnage ; bona fide stores and provisions for ships in port in quantities which the Collector considers reasonable ; produce or manufactures of local origin for other ports in the Colony ; specie ; goods in packages not cxceeding 250 mils in value accompanying a passenger on departure ; shingle and sand.
2. Stores and equipment for vessels of war and for yachts used solely for the purpose of pleasure.
3. All goods certified by a properly authorised representative of the United Nations Relief and Rehabilitation Administration in Cyprus to be exported by or for the purposes of such administration.
4. Vehicles and goods exported by visitors exempted from wharfage dues under and in accordance with the Customs (Wharfage Concessions to Visitors) Order.
