THE CURFEWS LAW, 1955.

ORDER MADE UNDER SECTION 2.

In exercise of the powers vested in him by section 2 of the Curfews Law. 1955, His Excellency the Governor has been pleased to make the following Order :-

1. This Order may be cited as the Curfews (Limassol District No. 4)

Order, 1955.

2. No person within the area of the municipal boundaries of Limassol shall be out of doors on the dates and during the hours prescribed in the Schedule hereto except under the written authority of the Commissioner of Limassol or the Superintendent of Police or Assistant Superintendent of Police of Limassol:

Provided that this Order shall not apply to any member of the Executive

Council, Her Majesty's Forces or the Cyprus Police Force.

This Order shall come into force on the 28th day of September, 1955, and thereupon the Curfews (Limassol District No. 3) Order, 1955, shall be revoked without prejudice to anything done or left undone thereunder.

THE POLICE LAW.

CAP. 265 AND LAWS 24 OF 1953, 31 OF 1954 AND 21 OF 1955.

Order made by the Commissioner under Section 25A.

In exercise of the powers vested in me under section 25A of the Police Law, I, the Commissioner of Police, do hereby prohibit between the hours of 6 a.m. 29th September and 6 p.m. 29th September, within the area specified in Part I of the Schedule hereto all kinds of vehicular traffic except that specified in Part II of the said Schedule.

2. This Order shall expire on the 30th September unless in the meantime it is confirmed by the Governor in Council.
