THE ADULTERATION OF AGRICULTURAL PRODUCE
LAW, 1954.

## Regulations made under Section iz.

In exercise of the powers vested in him under section 13 of the Adulteration of Agricultural Produce Law, 1954, His Excellency the Governor, 59 of 1954. with the advice of the Executive Council, has been pleased to make the following Regulations:-
I. These Regulations may be cited as the Adulteration of Agricultural Produce Regulations, 1957.
2. In these Regulations, unless the context otherwise requires-
"Law" means the Adulteration of Agricultural Produce Law, r954; 59 of 1954.
"produce" means, for the purposes of section 2 (I) of the Law, the produce hereby prescribed and specified in the First Schedule First hereto and includes cereal offals (products of milling) and oil seed Schedule. residues (cakes, meals) for feeding to livestock;
"superfluous or inferior substance" means broken, damaged or infested produce. With regard to nuts, cereals and other seeds it shall include sprouted or light nuts and seeds. With regard to carobs and almonds it shall include wild carobs and bitter almonds respectively.
3. The proportion of foreign, superfluous or inferior substance, matter or thing permitted in the sale or preparation for sale in the Colony, or in the import of any produce set out in the first column of the First Schedule hereto First shall not be greater than the maximum percentage set out in the second Schedule. and third columns of the said Schedule against each produce :

Provided that, where the Director is satisfied that any imported produce will be used solely for further processing in the Island, broken produce of whatever percentage shall not be deemed to be a superfluous or inferior substance :

Provided further that a maximum of twenty per cent broken rice and five per cent broken shelled nuts shall not be deemed to be a superfluous or inferior substance.
4. The Director may, by notification in the Gazette, stipulate the minimum specific gravity of produce specified in the First Schedule hereto intended for local sale, or import.
5. The Director may, for special reasons and subject to such conditions as he may deem fit to impose, permit the local sale and import of any produce specified in the First Schedule hereto which contains foreign, superfluous or inferior substance, matter or thing in excess of the percentage permitted in the said Schedule.
6. The importer or his agent shall pay to the Collector of Customs at Second the port of import the examination and re-examination fees set out in the Schedule. Second Schedule to these Regulations.
7. The Adulteration of Produce Regulations, 1955 to 1956, are hereby Gazettes: revoked.

For every 40 okes or part of 40 okes of shelled nuts (kerncls) imported and submitted for re-examination ..... 150
Provided that, where the Director is satisfied that any consignment of shelled groundnuts is imported solely for use in oil extraction, the fee shall be 100 mils for every ton or part of a ton ;
Oil cake :
For every ton or part of a ton imported and submitted for examination or re-examination..
Oil seeds and oil nuts, not elsewhere specified :
For every ton or part of a ton imported and submitted for examination or re-examination
Olives, olive oil or other edible oils :
_. For every ton or part of a ton of olives, olive oil, or other edible oils imported and submitted for examination or re-examination

Potatoes and Onions :
For every package of onions or potatoes not exceeding 40 okes imported
(including seed potatoes) submitted for examination ..
For every package of onions or potatoes not exceeding 40 okes (including seed potatoes) imported and submitted for re-examination .. .. 10
Raisins and Dried Fruit :
For every package imported and submitted for examination .. .. 10
For every package submitted for re-examination .. .. .. .. 20
Rice :
For every ton or part of a ton of rice imported and submitted for examination or re-examination
Vegetable and Flower seeds :
(a) Imported in small packets (containing not more than ro gm. each) :

For every five packets or part thereof imported and submitted for examination or re-examination
(b) Imported in bulk :

For every ten okes or part thereof imported and submitted for examination or re-examination
Provided that the minimum examination or re-examination fees shall be 20 mils and that the total examination or re-examination fees shall be payable to the nearest multiple of 5 mils.

If in the opinion of the Inspector a chemical analysis is required to ascertain whether a produce is adulterated, the prescribed fees for the time being in force for such chemical analysis for each sample submitted by the Inspector shall be payable to the Collector of Customs at the port of entry by the importer or his agent.

THE EMERGENCY POWERS (PUBLIC SAFETY AND ORDER) REGULATIONS, 1955.

Order made under Regulation 38 (i).
I, the Commissioner of Troodos, in exercise of the powers vested in me by paragraph ( I ) of Regulation 38 of the Emergency Powers (Public Safety and Order) Regulations, 1955, do hereby order as follows :-
I. This Order may be cited as the Protected Areas (Troodos District No. i) Order, 1957.
2. The area specified in the Schedule hereto is hereby declared to be a protected area for the purpose of Regulation 38 of the Emergency Powers (Public Safety and Order) Regulations, 1955 .
3. This Order shall come into force at 06.00 hours on the 1 st September, 1957, and shall remain in force until ir.00 hours on the same day unless revoked or extended by a supplementary order under my hand.
