## THE SUPPLIES AND SERVICES (TRANSITIONAL POWERS) (CYPRUS) ORDER, 1946.

ORDER MADE BY THE GOVERNOR UNDER DEFENCE REGULATION 64.

In exercise of the powers vested in him by Defence Regulation 64, as set out in the First Schedule to the Supplies and Services (Transitional Powers) (Cyprus) Order, 1946 (which continues in force in consequence of the Supplies and Services (Continuance) Order, 1957), His Excellency the Governor has been pleased to order as follows:—

- 1. Subject to the restrictions and conditions contained in the First Schedule to this Order, the use, for military purposes, of theland and property specified in the Second Schedule (hereinafter referred to as "the land") during the period of six months from the date of this Order is hereby authorized.
- 2. The persons using the land in pursuance of this Order are entitled to do thereon or in relation thereto such acts as may be necessary for such military purposes.
- 3. The exercise of any right of way over the land and of any other right relating thereto which is enjoyed by any person, whether by virtue of an interest in the land or otherwise, is hereby prohibited during the period this Order shall remain in force.

## FIRST SCHEDULE.

- I. The land shall be occupied and used for military purposes only.
- 2. At the expiration of this Order the land shall be restored to the persons entitled thereto free of any erection, structure or construction erected or constructed thereon after the making of this Order.
- 3. Compensation shall be paid to the persons having an interest on the land for its use and occupation under this Order.

## SECOND SCHEDULE.

All that area of privately owned land under part of plots Nos. 243, 508, 512, 513 and 514 in Famagusta town more particularly defined as the area coloured red on the plan signed by the Assistant Director of Hirings, Cyprus, dated the 12th May, 1958, and deposited in the Office of the Commissioner, Famagusta.

## THE FOREIGN DESERTERS LAW. CAP. 272.

NOTIFICATION UNDER SUB-SECTION (2) OF SECTION 2.

Notice is hereby given that section 2 of the Foreign Deserters Law shall apply in the case of the Federal Republic of Germany subject to the following limitations, conditions and qualifications, namely,

(a) the said section shall only apply as respects seamen and apprentices who desert from ships registered at any port in the Federal

Republic of Germany, and when those ships are within the Colony, and

(b) nothing in the said section shall be taken to confer any power or impose any duty or obligation on any court or officer in relation to the apprehension, or conveyance on board his ship, of any deserter who satisfies that court or officer that he is :-

(i) a citizen of the United Kingdom and Colonies or a Southern

Rhodesian citizen or a British protected person; or
(ii) a person in respect of whom there is reasonable ground for believing that his life or liberty will be endangered for reasons of race, nationality, political opinion or religion, in any country to which his ship is likely to go.

THE FOREIGN DESERTERS LAW. No. 438.

CAP. 272.

Notification under sub-section (2) of Section 2.

Notice is hereby given that section 2 of the Foreign Deserters Law shall apply in the case of the Italian Republic subject to the following limitations, conditions and qualifications, namely,

- (a) the said section shall only apply as respects seamen and apprentices who desert from ships registered at any port in the Italian Republic or in any territory for whose international relations Italy is responsible and when those ships are within the Colony; and
- (b) nothing in the said section shall be taken to confer any power or impose any duty or obligation on any court or officer in relation to the apprehension, or conveyance on board his ship, of any deserter who satisfies that court or officer that he is :-
  - (i) a citizen of the United Kingdom and Colonies or a Southern Rhodesian citizen or a British protected person; or
  - (ii) a person in respect of whom there is reasonable ground for believing that his life or liberty will be endangered for reasons of race, nationality, political opinion or religion, in any country to which his ship is likely to go.
