THE EMERGENCY POWERS (PUBLIC SAFETY AND ORDER)
REGULATIONS, 1955 TO (No. 2) 1958.

ORDER MADE UNDER REGULATION 34.

In exercise of the powers vested in me by Regulation 34 of the Emergency Powers (Public Safety and Order) Regulations, 1955 to (No. 2) 1958, I, the Governor, do hereby order as follows :—

1. This Order may be cited as the Emergency Powers (Control of Public Service Motor Vehicles by Night) (No. 2) Order, 1958.
2. In this order “ public service motor vehicle ” means a motor vehicle used for the conveyance of passengers, whether used also for the carriage of goods or not, for hire or reward or for the purposes of plying for hire but does not include a motor vehicle of seven seats or less hired out to the driver by the hirer or his agent.
3. Notwithstanding anything in any Law or public instrument contained, from and after the 16th day of July, 1958, no public service motor vehicle shall be used on any road within the Colony between the hours of 7.30 p.m. and 4.30 a.m. unless the person driving such vehicle is in possession of a permit granted to him under the hand of the Chief Constable, or under the hand of any person authorised by him in that behalf, and subject to such terms and conditions as may be specified in such permit.
4. Nothing in this Order contained shall apply to any person acting in the course of his duty as—
 - (a) a member of Her Majesty’s Forces ; or
 - (b) a Police Officer.
5. The Emergency Powers (Control of Motor Vehicles) Order, 1958, is hereby revoked.
