No. 950. THE EMERGENCY POWERS ORDERS IN COUNCIL, 1939 AND 1956.

REGULATIONS MADE BY THE GOVERNOR UNDER SECTION 6.

In exercise of the powers conferred on me by section 6 of the Emergency Powers Orders in Council, 1939 and 1956, I, the Governor, do hereby make the following Regulations:-

1. These Regulations may be cited as the Emergency Powers (Public Short title. Safety and Order) (Amendment) (No. 6) Regulations, 1958, and shall be read Gazettes: as one with the Emergency Powers (Public Safety and Order) Regulations, No. 3. 1955 to (No. 5) 1958 (hereinafter referred to as "the principal Regulations"), and the principal Regulations and these Regulations may together be cited as the Emergency Powers (Public Safety and Order) Regulations, 1955 to 16.10.1958. 2. The Interpretation Law shall apply to the interpretation of these Interpret-Regulations and any order given thereunder as it applies to the interpretation ation. of a Law and, for the purposes of the said Law, these Regulations shall be 30 of 1953 deemed to be Laws.

3. The principal Regulations are hereby amended by revoking regulation 3 thereof, without prejudice to anything done or left undone thereunder, and by substituting therefor the following new regulation to be numbered "3":—

" Power to arrest without warrant. 3.—(1) Any Police Officer or any member of Her Majesty's Naval, Military, or Air Forces, acting in the course of his duties as such, may arrest without warrant—

- (a) any person in respect of whom he has reason to believe that there are grounds which would justify the making of a detention order in respect of such person under section 2 of the Detention of Persons Laws, 1955, or under Regulation 6 of these Regulations;
- (b) any person whom he has reasonable grounds for suspecting to have acted or be acting or be about to act in a manner prejudicial to public safety or to public order or to have committed or be committing or be about to commit an offence against these Regulations,

and such Police Officer or member of Her Majesty's Naval, Military or Air Forces may take such steps and use such force as may appear to him to be reasonably necessary for effecting such arrest.

(2) Any person so arrested shall be brought as soon as reasonably may be before the police officer for the time being in charge of any police division and such person may, by order of such police officer be lodged in any place or building there to be detained for such period as may be specified in

the order not exceeding twenty-eight days.

(3) Any person detained as in this Regulation provided shall be deemed to be in lawful custody during the period

of such detention".

4. The Emergency Powers (Arrest and Detention) (Temporary Provisions) Regulations, 1958, are hereby revoked without prejudice to anything done or left undone thereunder.

5. Without prejudice to the generality of Regulation 2 of these Regulations any order made under the Regulation revoked by Regulation 3 of these Regulations in force immediately before the date of coming into force of these Regulations, and any order made under the Regulations revoked by Regulation 4 of these Regulations in force immediately before the date of coming into force of these Regulations, shall be deemed to have been made under the corresponding provisions of these Regulations and shall have effect as such.
