1. This Law may be cited as the Customs, Excise, and Revenue Law, 1927.

35.—(1) The import duty payable on any motor car or Reduced motor cycle or shot gun imported by and for the use of import duty any visitor to Cyprus shall be one pound, ten shillings cars, motor and five shillings respectively for each month or part of cycles, and a month during which such motor car or motor cycle or imported by shot gun shall remain in Cyprus.

Provided that:

(i.) the visitor on arrival in Cyprus of the motor car or motor cycle or shot gun shall deposit with the proper officer of Customs the sum of four pounds or two pounds or one pound, as the case may be, and

(ii.) a declaration in the form in the Thirteenth Schedule hereto is made by the visitor on the importation of the motor car or motor cycle or shot gun, and

(iii.) the motor car or motor cycle or shot gun is exported by the visitor within four months from the

date of the importation thereof.

(2) Any person who fails to export any motor car or motor cycle or shot gun within the period of four months as aforesaid shall pay forthwith the full amount of the import duty prescribed in the Second Schedule hereto less any sum deposited on the arrival in Cyprus of the motor car or motor cycle or shot gun.

(3) Any person who makes a declaration for the purpose of this section knowing the same to be untrue in any material particular, or who acts in contravention of, or fails to comply with, any of the provisions of this section,
