A LAW TO AMEND THE NEWSPAPER, BOOKS AND PRINTING PRESSES LAWS, 1930 AND 1932.

BE it enacted:

1. This Law may be cited as the Newspaper, Books Short title. and Printing Presses (Amendment) Law, 1933, and shall be read as one with the Newspaper, Books and Printing Presses Law, 1930, as amended by the Newspaper, Books 23 of 1930. and Printing Presses (Amendment) Law, 1932, (here- 32 of 1932. inafter together referred to as "the Principal Law").

2. Section 15 of the Principal Law is hereby amended Amendment as follows :-

of section 15 of Principal

- (a) By inserting in sub-section (1) after the words "signed by the proprietor" the words "or, in his absence, by his agent duly authorized by Power of Attorney deposited in the office of the Colonial Secretary".
- (b) By inserting after sub-section (2) the following sub-section :-
 - "(3) In any case in which the proprietor of a newspaper is a company the copy required to be delivered shall be signed by the secretary of the company or the person acting as such."
- 3. Section 27 of the Principal Law is hereby repealed Repeal of and the following section substituted therefor:

"No person to keep printing press without permit.

- 27.—(1) No person shall keep or have in his Law and possession any printing press without having of new previously obtained a permit under the hand section. of the Colonial Secretary.
- (2) No permit shall be granted unless and until the person or persons respectively applying therefor has satisfied the Colonial Secretary that-
 - (a) He is of good character;
 - (b) He has not been convicted of any offence under section 49 or 52 of the Cyprus Criminal Code Order in Council, 1928;
 - (c) He has resided in the Colony for a period of not less than one year preceding his application:

section 27 of Principal Provided that where application is made on behalf of a company, the directors and secretary thereof for the time being shall respectively satisfy the Colonial Secretary that they comply with the requirements of this sub-section.

(3) Before any permit under this part of this Law shall be granted, the person or persons respectively applying therefor shall submit an application in writing to the Colonial Secretary accompanied by a declaration on oath substantiating the facts set out in such application in the form prescribed in the Third Schedule to this Law, to be made and subscribed before a Judge:

Provided that any application on behalf of a company shall be accompanied by such declaration so made in the prescribed form by each of the directors and secretary thereof respectively.

(4) All proceedings relating to the making of the declaration referred to in sub-section (3) hereof shall be deemed to be judicial pro-

ceedings.

(5) The Colonial Secretary may cancel any permit granted under this section if the person to whom it was granted at any time after the grant of such permit ceases to fulfil any of the requirements prescribed in sub-section (2) hereof or has permanently left the Colony.

- (6) Where any permit has been granted to any company such permit may be cancelled if any director or the secretary thereof for the time being respectively fails to fulfil any of the requirements prescribed in sub-section (2) hereof.
- (7) Every person who keeps or has in his possession any printing press without a permit or if a company so keeps or has in its possession a printing press the directors and secretary thereof, shall be guilty of an offence and on conviction thereof shall be liable for each offence to a fine not exceeding twenty pounds or to imprisonment not exceeding six months or to both such fine and imprisonment."

4. The Third Schedule to the Principal Law is hereby repealed and the following schedule substituted thereof:—

A LAW FURTHER TO AMEND THE POLICE LAWS, 1878 TO 1932.

BE it enacted:-

Amendment of section 4 of the Principal Law.

66 of 1932.

1. This Law may be cited as the Police (Amendment) Law, 1933, and shall be read as one with the Police Laws, 1878 to 1932, (hereinafter referred to as "the Principal Law "), and the Principal Law and this Law may together be cited as the Police Laws, 1878 to 1933.

2. Section 4 of the Principal Law is hereby amended by the addition thereto of the following provisoes:-

"Provided that the Chief Commandant may discharge any Non-Commissioned Officer or Private at any time during the currency of his engagement-

(a) if pronounced by a Government Medical Officer or by any Medical Board appointed to enquire into the state of his health, mentally or physically unfit for further service,
