BE it enacted:

1. This Law may be cited as the Post Office (Amendment) Law, 1933, and shall be read as one with the Post Office Laws, 1881 and 1928, (hereinafter referred to as "the Principal Law"), and the Principal Law and this Law may together be cited as the Post Office Laws, 1881 to 1933.

Repeal of section 31 of the Principal Law and substitution of new section. 2. Section 31 of the Principal Law is hereby repealed and the following section substituted therefor:—

31. Every person employed by or under the Post Office, who shall contrary to his duty—

(a) open or procure or suffer to be opened

a postal packet, or

(b) wilfully detain or delay or procure or suffer to be detained or delayed a postal packet,

shall be guilty of an offence and shall on conviction be liable to imprisonment not exceeding two years or to a fine or to both such imprisonment and fine:

Provided that nothing in this section contained

shall apply or extend-

- (i) to the opening or detaining or delaying of a postal packet in pursuance of any of the provisions of this Law or of any other Law for the time being in force for the management of the postal business of Cyprus, or
- (ii) to the opening or detaining or delaying of a postal packet in obedience to an express warrant in writing under the hand and seal of the Governor."
