A LAW TO AMEND THE LAW TO CONTROL AND PROMOTE PUBLIC HEALTH IN SUMMER RESORTS. A.D. 1934.

BE it enacted:—

1. This Law may be cited as the Public Health (Summer Resorts) Amendment Law, 1934, and shall be read as one with the Public Health (Summer Resorts) Law, 1928, (hereinafter called "the Principal Law"), and the Principal Law and this Law may together be cited as the Public Health (Summer Resorts) Laws, 1928 and 1934. 2. Paragraph (e) of sub-section (3) of section 4 of the Principal Law is hereby amended by the deletion of the words "persons representing local interests in the Summer Resort" and the substitution therefor of the words "suitable persons". Amendment

3. Section 14 of the Principal Law is hereby amended as follows:— Amendment

(a) By the deletion from paragraph (1) of the words "every house" and the substitution therefor of the words "all premises".

(b) By the insertion immediately after paragraph (14) of the following paragraphs, the subsequent paragraph being re-numbered accordingly:—

"(15) To provide for the inspection of all flesh, fish, vegetables and all other foodstuffs of whatever kind or nature, and of liquids intended for human consumption, whether exposed for sale or deposited, and to seize and destroy any foodstuffs or liquids unfit for human consumption and generally to deal with any foodstuffs or liquids intended for human consumption in such manner as may be prescribed by bye-laws made in that behalf.

(16) To prevent the accumulation in any public or private place of any filth or refuse in a manner dangerous to the public health.

(17) To provide for the licensing of any person who wishes to carry on, exercise or practise any profession, business, trade or other calling.

(18) To regulate and control the keeping of coffee-houses and kilns.

(19) To regulate and control any trade or business which may be injurious to public health or a source of public danger or which otherwise it is in the interest of the Summer Resort or the persons ordinarily or temporarily residing therein expedient to regulate.

(20) To keep, if required so to do by the competent authority, suitable stores for storing any explosive substance or petroleum in accordance with the Explosives and Petroleum Laws in force for the time being and to prescribe storage fees for explosive substances or petroleum.

(21) To prohibit or regulate the keeping of swine and to regulate the keeping of other animals so that their keeping shall not be a public nuisance or injurious to health.

(22) To provide for the allotment of special places for the sale of perishable goods.

(23) To prevent any hotel, khan, cook-shop, bar, coffee-house, confectionery-shop, pastry-shop, cake-bakery of any kind, bath or barber's shop and the various tools and objects used therein from being in an unclean or insanitary state.

(24) To regulate and control factories where steam, electric or mechanical power is used or in which any explosive substance is used."

Amendment
of section 15

4. Section 15 of the Principal Law is hereby amended as follows:—

(a) By the deletion from paragraph (3) of the word "house" wherever it occurs therein and the substitution therefor of the word "premises".

(b) By the deletion therefrom of paragraph (4) and the substitution therefor of the following paragraph:—

"(4) Fees to be paid for the issue of licences to persons who wish to carry on, exercise or practise any profession, business, trade or other calling."

(c) By the deletion therefrom of paragraph (6) and the substitution therefor of the following paragraph:—

"(6) Fees to be paid by the owner of any premises whether let or in the occupation of the owner during the summer season or any part thereof:

Provided that no fees shall be payable in respect of premises let or used for agricultural purposes.”

(d) By the insertion immediately after paragraph (7) of the following paragraphs:—

“(8) Fees to be paid in respect of the hawking of any goods.

(9) Fees to be paid by the owner or occupier of any premises used as an hotel, lodging house or khan.

(10) Generally, fees to be paid in respect of any licence or permit which the Board is empowered to issue or grant under this Law or any bye-law made thereunder.”

5. Section 18 of the Principal Law is hereby repealed and the following section substituted therefor:—

“Penalty for contravention of bye-laws.

18.—(1) Any person who by any act or omission shall contravene any bye-law duly made under this Law shall be guilty of an offence and shall on summary conviction be liable for each such offence to a fine not exceeding five pounds.

(2) The Magisterial Court before which any person is convicted under this section shall, in addition to the penalty it may consider fit to impose on such person and in addition to the costs of the proceedings, order such person to pay any fees or rates connected with the charge, which such person ought to have paid and which he failed or refused or neglected to pay.

(3) All such fees and rates ordered by the Court to be paid shall be recoverable in the same way as fines and penalties are recovered under any law in force for the time being for the recovery of fines and penalties.

(4) All fines, fees, rates and costs recovered under this section shall be paid to and shall form part of the Public Health Fund hereinafter established.”

Repeal of section 18 of Law 12 of 1928 and substitution of new section.

This Law came into operation on 1st June, 1934.
