A LAW TO ENLARGE THE POWERS OF COMMISSIONERS TO COMPOUND OFFENCES.

Officer Administering the Government.

BE it enacted:

- 1. This Law may be cited as the Compounding of Short title. Offences Law, 1936.
- 2.—(1) When any person is reasonably suspected of Power to having committed any of the offences set out in the third Commiscolumn of the Schedule punishable under any of the Laws compound specified in the second column thereof, the Commissioner certain of the District in which the offence is alleged to have been committed may compound the offence by accepting from such person a payment in money not exceeding the maximum monetary penalty prescribed for the offence by the respective Law.

(2) When an offence is compoundable under this section, an attempt to commit such offence (when such attempt is itself an offence) may be compounded in like

manner.

- (3) Where by any of the Laws specified in the second column of the Schedule it is provided that upon the conviction of the offender for any of the offences set out in the third column of the Schedule any animals or things in respect of which the offence has been committed shall be forfeited, the Commissioner who compounds the offence may, in addition to any payment in money, require the offender to forfeit any such animals or things or such part thereof as the Commissioner may think fit.
- 3. Where any payment has been made to the Commis- commissioner under section 2, the Commissioner shall give to the sioner to give acknow. person making the payment an acknowledgment under ledgment. his hand showing-

(a) the amount paid;

(b) the particulars of the offence compounded; and

(c) the name, surname and place of abode of the person in respect of whose offence the composition has been made:

Provided that where the Commissioner has exercised the power conferred on him by section 2 (3), the acknowledgment shall show the nature and approximate value of the animals or things forfeited.

Effect of acknowledgment.

4. When an offence has been compounded under this Law and an acknowledgment in respect thereof has been given by the Commissioner under section 3, no proceedings shall be taken against the person whose offence has been so compounded in respect of that offence, and the production of the acknowledgment before any Court shall be sufficient evidence that the offence has been compounded and shall have the effect of an acquittal of the person charged with the offence.

Amounts paid to form part of Revenue.

5. Where an offence has been compounded under this Law and a payment in respect thereof has been made to the Commissioner under section 2, the amount so paid shall form part of the Revenue of the Colony:

Provided that, where it is by law prescribed that any monetary penalty in respect of such offence shall form part of a particular fund, such amount shall be paid into

such fund.

Power to Governor in Council to amend Schedule.

6. The Governor may, by Order in Council to be published in the Gazette, make any substitution in, alteration of, or addition to, the Schedule, and thereupon such Order in Council and the Schedule shall be read and construed together:

Provided that no substitution, alteration or addition shall be made whereby an offence punishable with imprisonment exceeding six months or with a fine exceeding twenty-five pounds or with both is made compoundable.

7. The Compounding of Offences Law, 1901, and the Repeal. Compounding of Offences (Amendment) Law, 1926, are hereby repealed.
