A Law to prohibit the melting or improper use of coins.

Governor.

BE it enacted by His Excellency the Governor and Commander-in-Chief of the Colony of Cyprus as follows:—

Short title.

1. This Law may be cited as the Coinage (Protection) Law, 1942.

Interpretation. 2. In this Law—

"coin" means any gold, silver, nickel or bronze coin, but does not include gold or silver coins used for the purposes of ornament as hitherto customary in the Colony.

Prohibition of melting, etc., of coins.

**3.**—(1) No person shall melt down, break up or use otherwise than as currency any coin which is for the time being current in the Colony or in any other country:

Provided that the Governor may, in his discretion and subject to such terms and conditions as he may think fit to impose, grant, either generally or in respect of a particular person or class of persons, a licence to melt down, break up or use otherwise than as currency any coin.

- (2) Any person who—
  - (a) acts in contravention of the provisions of subsection (1) of this section; or
  - (b) acts in contravention of, or fails to comply with, any of the terms or conditions imposed by a licence granted under the provisions of the proviso to sub-section (1) of this section;

shall be guilty of an offence and shall be liable to imprisonment for two years or to a fine of one hundred pounds, or to both such imprisonment and fine, and any articles in respect of which the offence has been committed shall be forfeited.

Repeal. 20 of 1921 4. The Gold and Silver Coinage (Protection) Law, 1921, is hereby repealed.
