### THE CUSTOMS LAWS, 1936 TO 1939.

### ORDER IN COUNCIL No. 1907

#### MADE UNDER SECTION 52.

## W. D. BATTERSHILL,

Governor.

In exercise of the powers vested in him by section 52 of the Customs Laws, 1936 to 1939, His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, is pleased to order and it is hereby ordered as follows:—

1. This Order may be cited as the Importation of Textiles (Restriction) Order, 1939.

#### 2. In this Order—

- "textile goods" means piece goods containing fifty per cent. or more of cotton, silk or artificial silk, or of cotton, silk or artificial silk combined.
- 3. From and after the 1st day of January, 1940, the importation into the Colony of textile goods not being consigned from and produced or manufactured in the British Empire (other than Canada and Newfoundland) is prohibited save under the authority of a licence granted by the Registrar of Co-operative Societies and subject to such terms and conditions as may be prescribed in such licence.
- 4.—(1) The Registrar of Co-operative Societies may require that a certificate of origin for British Empire textile goods shall be submitted to him at the time of importation and may if he thinks fit require that such certificate of origin should bear on it an endorsement of a Chamber of Commerce or other responsible body: Provided that where a consignment of British Empire textile goods is of a value not exceeding five pounds no such endorsement on the certificate of origin in respect thereof shall be required.
- (2) The certificate of origin shall be in the Form A and the endorsement of a Chamber of Commerce in the Form B and the endorsement of the Federation of British Industries (Incorporated by Royal Charter) in the Form C as set out in the First Schedule thereto.
- (3) In the case of United Kingdom textile goods the endorsement on a certificate of origin may be given only by the Federation of British Industries or by one of the Chambers of Commerce set out in the Second Schedule.
- (4) In the case of textile goods from Hong Kong the endorsement on a certificate of origin may be given only by the Superintendent of Imports and Exports Hong Kong and shall be in the form set out in the Third Schedule hereto.

THE EMERGENCY POWERS (DEFENCE) ACT, 1939.

REGULATIONS MADE BY THE GOVERNOR UNDER SECTION 1.

W. D. BATTERSHILL, Governor.

In exercise of the powers vested in him by section 1 of the Emergency Powers (Defence) Act, 1939, His Excellency the Governor has been pleased to make and hereby makes the following regulations:—

Short title.

1. These Regulations may be cited as the Emergency Powers Importation of Textiles (Quotas) Law, 1934, Suspension Regulations, 1939.

Suspension of Law 31 of 1934.

2. The operation of the Importation of Textiles (Quotas) Law, 1934, shall, during the continuance in force of these Regulations, be suspended as from the 1st day of January, 1940.
